<div><p>People get married to show love, make a promise, or start a family.</p></div> <div><p>A wedding brings families and communities together to celebrate a couple.</p></div>		<div><p>A love marriage is chosen by the couple; an arranged marriage is chosen with family help.</p><p>Some people choose arranged marriage because of culture, religion, or family values.</p></div>		<div><p>Christian vows are promises like “for richer, for poorer” and “till death do us part.”</p><p>Christians see marriage as a covenant made in front of God.</p></div> <div><p>Buddhist marriage is based on kindness, respect, and right intention.</p><p>Monks may chant blessings, sprinkle water, and tie thread around the couple’s wrists.</p></div> <div><p>In a Hindu wedding, the couple walk around the sacred fire to symbolise their shared journey in life.</p><p>Hindus believe marriage is a sacred duty that connects two families and souls.</p></div> <div><p>Non-religious people marry to show love and make a legal promise.</p><p>A humanist wedding reflects the couple’s own values without religion.</p></div>
